Review of 2011

The European Sign Language Centre (ESLC) was founded in 2009 as a non-political, non-profit organization based in Örebro, Sweden. ESLC works with accessibility issues for sign language and is running the world's largest webbased translation tool for sign language, www.spreadthesign.com, established in 16 countries.

The organization

The organization 'European Sign Language Center' (ESLC) has a main objective to manage, improve and develop Spread the sign. ESLC is a non-profit organization where most work is done by unpaid volunteers. The association has a few employees whose salaries come from the various projects. ESLC are hiring mainly deaf people and sees this as an important part of the work of Spread the sign.

The project manager for the Spread the sign is Lydell Thomas Olsen. He is also the person behind the idea of this web based sign language dictionary. Thomas is a volunteer of the association, and therefore he doesn't get any salary from the organization.

Organization work

ESLC started the year by strengthening the ongoing Swedish sign language documentation by hiring Edona Misou and Ekaterina Scherback. In the fall of 2011, we got a new team member, Mikael Sundberg, who will work as a web developer. Having previously collaborated with the Interpretation Center and shared space, in August we moved into a new, larger office on Sturegatan 9 in Orebro. Sweden.

ESLC now has a total of six employees and a well-functioning business. We have two facilities included Bertil Waldens gata 1.

Negotiations with Tele2 led to the funding of our app Spread Signs, launched just after the summer. We got very good exposure in both TV4, SVT morning sofa and several newspapers. Our plans of improving and releasing a new free application is well advanced. We have an agreement with Widespace and will invest in mobile marketing. We have decided to focus on search engine optimization so that more people can be reached.

We have over 75,000 documented signs, about 30 000 visitors a month and is established in 20 countries.

Countries and cooperations

We have cooperations with the United States, Estonia, Latvia, Poland and Uganda.

Meetings during the year

In April of 2011, we were invited by the Council of the Swedish delegation to the Council of Europe. We had an initial meeting with the Commissioner for Human Rights Thomas Hammarberg. For two days, we held an exhibition of our work with the international sign language dictionary, Sweden's role as manager of the national sign language, sign language capital of Europe and the need for a European sign language institute. We cooperated with Örebro Municipality which Financed our delegation to Which we Declared a detailed report.

We have had meetings with the Municipality of Örebro (MC) and Örebro county council (ÖLL) including Mayor Lena Båstad, County Council Chairman in Örebro Marie Louise Forsberg Fransson.
